## Teen CERT Class - April 1, 2, and 3

- Teen CERT training is for 9th to 12 th graders.
- There is no cost for the training.
- Only those who successfully complete the practical exercise with handson instruction in fire suppression, search and rescue, cribbing, and disaster medical operations will receive a certificate of completion.
- Participants will receive a CERT backpack containing emergency equipment, and credit for 20 hours of community service.


## Adult CERT Class - April 29 through May 1

CERT is about readiness, people helping people, rescuer safety, and doing the greatest good for the greatest number of victims. CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens will be initially on their own. Through training, citizens can manage utilities, put out small fires and treat the three killers by opening the airway, controlling bleeding, and treating for shock. CERT member can provide basic medical aid, search for and rescue victims safely and organize themselves to help mitigate disasters. CERT training is a commitment of 20 hours and there is no cost for the training. Only those who successfully complete the practical exercise with hands-on instruction in fire suppression, search and rescue, cribbing, and medical will receive a certificate of completion and a CERT backpack containing emergency equipment.
